## 3. **DELEGATIONS**

a) Iqaluit RCMP Detachment Monthly Report – March 2022

Staff Sergeant Robert Gallant, Iqaluit RCMP, presented the March 2022 Monthly Report and provided answers to various questions.

Councillor Akumalik asked if the detachment was planning for a visit from the Pope. Staff Sergeant Gallant noted that there have been background discussions but there is no official information at this time. He indicated that if official information becomes available, he will advise Council.

Councillor Quassa expressed concern that every effort should be made to deliver school messages in Inuktitut. He encouraged officers who speak Inuktitut to deliver the messages in schools.

b) Body Worn Camera Pilot Project – December 2020 to May 2021

Chief Superintendent Amanda Jones, Commanding Officer "V" Division RCMP, provided an update on the Body Worn Camera Pilot Project carried out from November 30, 2020 to May 31, 2021. The following are the highlights of her presentation:

- Public Awareness Campaign in Inuktitut, English and French
- 53 officers received training
- 3,600 videos from 5,400 calls for service
- Public survey was carried out regarding the body worn cameras
- Survey of the residents was carried out
  - o 70 community members participated which received positive views
  - o Only 13 participants identified as being Inuit
  - Concern was expressed regarding the Body Worn Camera Policy as it relates to when to turn the cameras off and on, privacy concerns and publicly releasing video footage.
- Officers were also surveyed
  - Were generally satisfied with the overall performance of the body worn cameras.
  - o Officers indicated that wearing the cameras made them feel safer.
  - o Officers expressed concern regarding privacy issues.
- The RCMP is in the final stages of the procuring and planning phase for the National Body Worn Camera and Digital Evidence Management System.

- Once the contract is awarded, a Field Test Phase with the contractors will be carried out.
- During the Field Test Phase, 300 body worn cameras will be tested in three divisions Nunavut (Iqaluit), Nova Scotia and Alberta.
- The Field Test will begin in the fall of 2022 for an eight-week period.
- The results of the Field Test will be evaluated prior to full deployment of the national Body Worn Camera Program.

Councillors asked various questions regarding the report, which Chief Superintendent Jones answered.

Sumon Ghosh, Director of Engineering and Capital Planning, presented a Request for Decision to award the Scrap Metal Removal Contract to remove scrap metal from the landfill site.

## c) Lake Geraldine Water Levels Report - Verbal

Amy Elgersma, Chief Administrative Officer, provided an update on Lake Geraldine water levels. She noted that 2022 has a higher level of water usage than the previous three years. She indicated that the increase in water usage is a result of flushing activities during the water contamination emergency, leaks identified within the water distribution system and the recent landfill fire.

Ms. Elgersma pointed out that there was an increase in the number of leaks from January to present and 17 repairs were carried out. She noted that Lake Geraldine is naturally replenished during the spring freshet, seasonal precipitation and the supplementary pumping program from the Apex River, which will start in early June.

Ms. Elgersma clearly indicated that there is no risk of a water shortage. She noted that with the low water level, residents should continue to conserve water and be responsible with water use.

Ms. Elgersma provided an update on the long-term water supply project known as the Iqaluit Water Infrastructure Project. She explained that the project will consist of three major components:

- Replacement of the piped water infrastructure
  - o Pipes that are affected by permafrost and aging pipe infrastructure
  - o Modernization of the water system, which includes real time monitoring and leak detection.
- New water supply
  - o Include a pipeline and pump station for either the Unnamed Lake or Sylvia Grinnell River to the reservoir.
  - Consultations are being finalized and a report will be presented to Council in a few months.
- New reservoir
  - o Will be located near Lake Geraldine for raw water storage.

Ms. Elgersma noted that currently, the City and the Government of Canada are finalizing the funding agreement for the funds.
